333 Bus Route Update

It was welcome news when the 333 bus service was announced as a fully functioning route. At the time of writing my report, there were a few teething issues with the early-morning buses, but I have been in regular contact with Central Connect to help get these resolved.



Now, a month on, I hope the service is running smoothly so that:

Workers and travellers can use the service early and late to reach Stansted Airport An hourly service is available on both Saturdays and Sundays

The service now runs via Station Approach, directly serving Braintree Train Station Upgraded vehicles have been introduced to improve passenger experience

A huge thank you to **Central Connect Essex & Hertfordshire** and **London Stansted Airport** for listening to the needs of our community and delivering a bus service that our village truly deserves.

Important Waste & Recycling Changes Coming to Braintree District

Braintree District Council's Cabinet has approved a new Waste & Recycling Strategy, in response to national changes introduced under the Government's Simpler Recycling scheme. These changes aim to make recycling easier, more consistent, and better for the environment.

During the recent consultation, the message from residents was clear: we must recycle more.

Data also shows that too much food waste is ending up in black bins, contributing to methane emissions in landfill. Soon, this black bin waste will be sent to the Rivenhall Incinerator, which will produce smoke vapour over the district. Recycling more isn't just good policy—it's essential for protecting our environment.

From summer next year, here's what to expect:

You will receive two new wheelie bins for recycling

Black bin collections will move to every 3 weeks

Absorbent Hygiene Products (nappies and sanitary items): residents can request separate collections every 2 weeks

Food waste collections will continue weekly

Green waste collections (for subscribers) will remain fortnightly

Paper and cardboard will be collected monthly (on alternate weeks)

Glass, plastics (including soft plastics), and metals will also be collected fortnightly (on alternate weeks)

Clinical waste collections will remain unchanged

All households will receive a printed collection calendar

Your collection day may change due to revised routes

What if you don't have room for more bins?

The Council is currently assessing properties. In the autumn, households will be informed whether they are classified as:

Standard properties – suitable for wheelie bins

Non-standard properties – including flats and homes with limited frontage, which will receive lidded boxes instead

Only around 13% of homes are expected to fall into the non-standard category.

Please remember: this is a national, legal change that applies to all councils. With everyone's cooperation, we can make this work and take an important step toward a cleaner, greener Braintree District.

Local Plan Update - Land Submissions in Rayne

On 19th June, Braintree District Council will be reviewing the land submitted during last year's Call for Sites exercise. Several parcels within Rayne Parish were put forward as potential development locations.

Once the agenda for this meeting is published, we will be able to see whether any of the Rayne sites have been proposed for allocation in the new, revised Local Plan.

As I'm writing this ahead of the meeting, I encourage residents to follow my social media channels for the latest updates and outcomes once the discussion has taken place.

Residents may welcome the news that some sites between Rayne and Braintree (but outside our parish) have *not* been allocated. This includes land north of the Flitch Way that formed part of the large Brook Green proposal—an application Rayne residents successfully opposed at appeal a few years ago.

Land to the south of the Flitch Way, due to its scale and complexity, will be considered at a later meeting in September.

Councillor Community Grants

I'm pleased to share that more funding from my Councillor Community Grant Fund has recently been allocated to support local groups in Rayne.

1st Rayne Scouts have received **£300** to help purchase much-needed camping equipment.

The Old School Room Committee has been awarded £350 to assist with the replacement of the front fence and gate.

It's fantastic to be able to support such worthwhile community projects that make a real difference to village life.

Wildlife Reports, till June 2025 14

Sonia Watts, Shalford Road 9/5 had a fishpond in their garden which had 9 very large Koi, 4 smaller ones and a Tench. I use the past tense as an Otter visited the garden and reduced the remaining fish to two Koi, one of which had its tail and fin eaten by the Otter. At first I queried if it was an Otter as though they have been recorded locally we had not had a sighting confirmed within the parish. Sonia had a recording on their cctv which confirmed it was. This should not be surprising as Pods Brook is an ideal highway for Otters to enter the Parish. Sonias husband did surround the pond with netting to try and prevent further visits, but this is a warning to villagers with garden ponds stocked with well-fed fish, they should also take precautions. One can become attached to pet fish just like a pet dog, cat or hamster. What upset Sonia especially was the fact that not all the fish were eaten for food, many were just killed.

Sue Dawson and her husband while walking their dogs towards the river heard a Cuckoo calling. At first it appeared to be getting closer, then it moved towards Panfield. My own hearing is not good, but I have not heard one in the Parish for many years.

At Goulds, in my last report I mentioned the female Mallard duck that appeared with 17 ducklings. Then over the next few days this large brood was reduced to 4 ducklings. Unfortunately, the female then lost the four. This was not due to a shortage of food as I was able to separate the mother and the ducklings from the other ducks and to feed them suitable food for several days before they disappeared. Unfortunately, the mother would not be able to protect the ducklings from predators such as Badgers and Foxes both of which hunt during the night and have well used paths through our garden. Ducklings of that age cannot be brooded by the mother on the water overnight. Another female appeared in the garden with 7 ducklings and immediately lost 6 and a day later the seventh.

Adult Mallard duck numbers are not under threat as I still have regular counts of up to 20 adult Mallard on the lawn every morning. This is usually equal numbers of male and females, when the female number is less than the male number at this time of the year it would indicate that the missing females could be sitting on a nest full of eggs. I have a range of bird feeders in the garden and the food wastage from these feeders is cleared by the duck which I do not encourage by direct feeding except when there are ducklings which I do give food to. As I have written in previous reports I wish to keep Mallard numbers at a sensible level. They have seriously affected our two main ponds with their excrement.

A pair of Moorhens have also arrived with two just hatched young. Their numbers have declined considerably in the last few years as they always used to have their nest in the vegetation growing in or on the water's edge of all ponds. Badgers and foxes soon realised that they provided easy meals and paddled out to nests and robbed both eggs and young. The Moorhens then started nesting in nearby shrubs and hedges but flying predators have also become major predators. Unfortunately, when the duckling first leaves the nest, it is a good swimmer but is not able to fly. The young of many bird species spend time in the nest flapping their wings before they leave it. I believe our garden Moorhen nested in our very old Oak that has numerous sites that could be used.



I have not mentioned one predator the Moorhen also had to contend with when I was young, these were myself and my boyhood friend Terry Runchman. At weekends we would provide food for ourselves and one of the items in our diet were hard boiled eggs from Mallard and Moorhen nests when in season. We would always leave at least 3 eggs in the nest so the owner continued laying and would only repeat the theft twice.

I am sure this would be a wildlife offence now if you were able to find enough nests for a juvenile's feast.



I had no pictures for this report until this morning when Syl and I watched from our bedroom window a juvenile Great Spotted Woodpecker demolishing a rotted branch of the oak tree. I committed a cardinal sin for any decent photographer and did not immediately rush to get the camera but watched the pecker demolish part of the branch on the left in the picture. It was looking for and finding insects while removing large flakes of rotting

wood. I then belatedly retrieved my camera and took only two pictures without making any adjustment to the camera settings. The pecker decided that was enough and flew off. Age is reducing my ability at knowing where the nest site of this juvenile pecker was, 70 years ago Terry and I would have known.

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Summer Months - Keeping your tyres in check

I'd normally write an article with crime prevention advice, however I thought I'd write something to point out the importance of legal tyre tread on your car.

With the warmer weather here it's really important to stay on top of your vehicle tyre pressures. You should do a cursory check of your vehicle (tyres, lights, indicators, brakes, fluids, screen wash) before driving. Extreme changes in temperature can affect your tyres.

In the UK the **minimum legal tread** depth for car tyres is 1.6mm across the central three-quarters of the tyre. This means that the tread must be at least 1.6mm deep across 75% of the tyre's circumference. It is imperative to change your tyres once this limit has been reached to avoid compromising your safety and breaking the law. In addition, illegal tread depth could result in points (3 points per tyre) on your driving licence and a fine of £2,500 per tyre. Any cuts, tears, bulges or lumps in the sidewall or tread could result in an MOT failure as they make tyres more susceptible to punctures and blowouts. IT'S WORTH CHECKING THEM REGULARLY don't rely on your annual MOT.
